### **Editorial**

Another 2 months has gone by and there has been a lot of MG activity which you can read about in this issue, hope it inspires you to attend a future event. On the home front I have bought another Morris 1100 off TradeMe to replace the written off one, It was perfect in that it had its registration on hold, had a good rust free body and a knackered engine. I paid top dollar as there was 3 of us bidding on it. I had looked at buying a de-registered 1100, but without number plates you can't prove it had been registered in NZ before and chassis number wasn't on their records either. Even then if it had been it would cost \$500 to have any rust repairs checked and they might require the body to be chemically stripped or sand blasted before you started and as it didn't have its engine that too would need to be checked separately. I decided that route was all too difficult and so I bought the one on TradeMe, I had it shipped to Wellington and soon had the engine and front sub-frame removed. Here is where it started to be less than perfect, removing the sub-frame revealed a couple of spots of rust in the usual suspect areas. A grinder with a wire brush attachment revealed a lot more rust as the metal around the bulkhead air-box looked sound but was in reality paper thin. So I have spent the last 3 weekends welding so the body is now structurally sound. There is still a bit of cosmetic welding to do. Before the new Morris arrived I did a bit of work on the MG, installing the headlining and the front and rear windscreens and putting Q mat (Dynamat) on the floor and bulkhead. The MG is of course on hold now that the Morris has arrived.

## **Old Speckled Hen Run - March**

The March Old Speckled Hen run was based around visits in the Upper Hutt and Whiteman's Valley area.

Our first stop was a visit to Martin Ferner's workshop to see some of the cars he owns. A retired engineer, Martin is well known in vintage circles and has restored several cars over the years. He had in his workshop a rare 1955 Swallow Doretti of which there were only a few hundred made. Using Triumph TR2 running gear it had a few enhancements the Triumph lacked. Martin recalled it was used as a family second car for many years in the 70s and 80s until he decided to restore it to as new condition.

He also owns a stunning 1913 Minerva which he bought in a disassembled state in the late 60s and spent the next 30 years totally rebuilding it. The time and difficulty in restoring a car such as this was truly staggering and is a testament to his skill and dedication. We were fortunate to see this car as he has just sold it to a new owner in Auckland. Martin is in his 80s and admitted he didn't now feel entirely comfortable driving the car in modern traffic. However, he drove the Minerva in the Austrian Alpine Rally in 2003. This rally was a re-enactment of the original in 1913. It was 2600

kilometres in length and climbed six alpine passes.

A 1950s Ralph Watson BSA Special attracted a lot of attention due to its interesting past ownership. You can Google 'Ralph Watson BSA Special' for lots of information about this car). We had to move on to our next destination so we didn't hear much about his 1953 Bentley and a late 1920s Alvis which was hiding under covers.

Our next visit was to Bristol Motors next door to Martin's workshop. We were met by the owner Dave Wilkens who introduced us to mechanic Neale, who acted as our guide. The Toyota Corolla at the entrance was totally outclassed by the other cars in the workshop. A very nice Austin Healey was followed by the star of the workshop, an early 1930s Hispano-Suiza. The car had started its life with a Shah of Persia before finding its way to the U.S. and then to its current owner in Wanaka. The latest owner had driven it to Hawkes Bay for the annual Art Deco weekend and had left it at Bristol's on the way back for them to do some general servicing. Neale said when the car was new it cost one and half times as much as the top of the line Rolls Royce.

Bristol's also had a 1920s Rolls Royce Rolls Royce Silver Ghost with 1930s body which they were restoring and when completed it would be off to Australia. We thought we had seen all there was to see but Neale led us through to a back work shop where more treasures awaited including an early 30s Alfa Romeo, 1915 De Dion-Bouton and another Rolls. It was certainly an eye opener to see the range of unique cars being trusted to them by their owners to work on.

By now it was lunchtime and after a short 30 minute drive to Whiteman's Valley we had a very pleasant lunch in nice surroundings at the Short Straw Café. The name comes from the fact that the walls are made of straw bales, plastered and painted over.

#### Technical d'Honneur - Barry Carrington

Recognition of outstanding service to the technical department. Barry Carrington is only the 11th person to receive this honour since it was inaugurated in 1992.

#### **Distinguished Service Award - Terry Collier**

To recognise service and personal contribution of time and effort to motorsport. Terry Collier is a long serving member of the Historic & Classic Commission of MSNZ

#### Lupp Trophy - Terry Collier

Inaugurated in 1997 to recognise the competitor who has demonstrated exceptional levels of sportsmanship, of vehicle presentation, and who embodies the very spirit and values associated with Historic and Classic Racing in New Zealand.

The trophy is from a collection of the late Sybil Lupp, kindly made available by the MG Car Club (Wellington Centre). Sybil Lupp commenced motorsport activities in 1947 and by 1952 held 144 trophies to her credit including a 5th in the inaugural Lady Wigram Trophy Race of 1949. It recognises both Sybil and Percy Lupps contribution to MSNZ.

Terry has competed for many years at MG Classic Race meetings, both Charity event and November Classic race meetings at Manfeild. Also the Skope Classic in 09 at Ruapuna in his MG Midget. More recently he has competed in his beautifully restored 1960 BMC MK2 Formula Junior at Hampton Downs in March. A car he imported from the USA.

Apart from racing his FJ and Midget, and previously his MGBGT Terry has been actively involved in organising Classic Race events as the Chairman of the MG Classic Race Committee for some 6 years, on behalf of the Wellington MG Club. In addition Terry has

## **MG Charity Classic - May**

This regular end of season meeting is now heading towards its 18th successive event. The timing, however, has often meant a bit of struggle for entries as people and cars take a refurbishment break before the next season.

This has resulted in a need to also invite along a clubman's or 'Allcomers' class to bulk up the entries and ensure economic viability. This small compromise has meant that the event can continue to provide the more relaxed low key atmosphere needed for older/ slower cars and those wanting to try motorsport in a classic oriented vehicle.

Of course, continuing to add to the over \$100,000 contributed to the Cancer Society over the past 17 events is also no mean feat. So congratulations are due to the organisers,

volunteers and participants for that. Despite seriously bad weather throughout the region the previous week, around 80 cars took the track in three classic type groups, an Allcomers class and, for the first time, an Historics group that included Vintage Car Club entrants - Steve Day in his magnificent Briggs Mercury single seater from the 1950s, and Peter Carroll in his marvellous little Austin 7 Special dating from the 1930s.

Perhaps the highlight though, was Tim Rush's 2.5 litre Brabham Climax BT4, one of only four built for the "Intercontinental Formula" in 1963, to be powered by the 2.7 litre Climax engine.

The 'Allcomers' races saw John Mines start his most recent JRM, the normal 1967 model having suffered engine damage in the South Island classic series. He battled all day with the factory built Radicals and

sole Reynard Inverter with the latter cars being predictably quick, but the JRM was never that far behind. Interestingly Mines has managed to buy back his very first 1963 JRM, discovered in Christchurch, and this should be seen in next season's Historic events. Jane Stella hung in there in her very straight looking Toyota Trueno and did not let the faster machinery bother her at all, showing that classic race meetings can provide good entry level opportunities for all.

The slower Classics group featured a good mix of cars with Neil Moore in the Jowett Jupiter down from Auckland for a return bout with Trevor Dixon's Humber 80 and David Neale in the MG Magnette. Ray Hartley had abandoned the Porsche 911 for a mildly modified MGF for a couple of 3rd placings and Tammie Boyden got a 1st in her 325i BMW.

The faster Classics groups saw some close racing with Philip Hehir again giving the rare Alfa Montreal V8 a good run while Don McLean continues to campaign the Datsun 240Z he has raced for the past 30 years or so. Pat Excell's rare and immaculate production Ford Anglia GT went very well as did Natalie Campbell in her faithful and reliable Ford Capri V6.

The Historics group had cars ranging from

Peter Carroll's 1930s Austin 7 Special to a 1983 Formula Ford, but Peter Avery's Brabham BT16 proved to be the quickest of the group because Tim Rush wanted to go easy with the BT4. Estimates put the value of the BT4 in the region of \$350,000, so caution was probably warranted.

Notable about the day was how the Historics attracted a lot of attention in the pits with spectators and drivers in the other classes all wanting to talk about the cars, what were they? where did they come from? What components were used? etc etc. The Briggs Mercury in particular was a favourite with the fans.

The event certainly provides good value for money, a competitor entry fee of \$130, public gate entry of a gold coin donation and a friendly relaxed atmosphere all provides a solid basis for continued cooperation between classics, clubmans and historic racers.
